### **Alternative Gift Giving Opportunity: A Summary of Charitable Organizations**

**Bread for the World** is a nonpartisan non-profit Christian voice urging our nation's decision-makers to expand anti-hunger programs and increase funding for nutrition programs. Studies have shown that malnutrition can cause stunting and other problems in the bodies and brains of children. Tackling inequities within the food system is a key to ending hunger and malnutrition. Data confirms the pandemic caused additional hunger.





**CEDEPCA** (Protestant Center for Pastoral Studies in Central America) is a non-profit organization headquartered in Guatemala. Contributions will be used to support its women's ministry. CEDEPCA is committed to having an impact on women in the region, with educational experiences grounded from a feminist theology. Activities are designed to empower women to assume their rights, learn to care for themselves, take leadership in their churches and communities, understand laws that help them, continue or begin studying, and to develop more equal relationships in their everyday lives.

**Micah's Backpack** is a non-profit faith community initiative that provides direct food assistance for children in low income families. Every Friday during the school year identified students receive a backpack filled with meals and snacks for the weekend and an educational piece. On Friday mornings, volunteers deliver the bags, and the partner schools distribute them to the students. Currently, a number of children in Blacksburg schools receive healthy food during the academic year and during the summer break.





**Presbyterian Children's Home of the Highlands, Inc.** (PCHH), Wytheville, is a residential children's home providing love, sanctuary, guidance, and support to children who have been removed from their homes and families. Many of the children are victims of various forms of abuse and neglect. If it is not possible for the children to return to their homes, they may stay at PCHH as alternative plans are developed or until their graduation.

### **Alternative Gift Giving Opportunity: A Summary of Charitable Organizations**

### BLACKSBURG REFUGEE PARTNERSHIP

Blacksburg Refugee Partnership is an organization run entirely by community volunteers. Refugee families are provided ongoing support to help them fully integrate into American society, become self-reliant, and achieve fulfilling lives. So far, volunteers have helped 21 adults and 19 children from Syria, Afghanistan, Burundi, and Somalia settle into new apartments, learn English, enroll in school, receive medical care, etc. With no overhead, all contributions directly help refugee families thrive.

**St. Luke and Odd Fellows Hall** is a museum of African American culture and a former social gathering spot for the African American community called New Town in Blacksburg. It was the only public gathering place for African American citizens and has strong sentimental meaning to the community. Efforts to preserve and restore the Hall continue through the Blacksburg Museum and Cultural Foundation. The exhibit on display is titled "From Civil War to Civil Rights," and the museum is free and open to the public by appointment.





UKirk Campus Ministry at Virginia Tech (Cooper House) partners with the Presbytery of the Peaks and four area churches, one of which is Blacksburg Presbyterian Church. Students gather for dinner, fellowship, worship, discussion, and for planning participation in mission activities locally and globally. Pastoral care is offered following its mission "to nurture the faith development and discipleship of the students, respond to human needs regardless of ethnicity, gender, or sexual orientation, and promote peace and justice as Christ teaches us."

VICCC (Valley Interfaith Child Care Center, Inc.) is a 501(c)3 organization that serves children of low-income families. With special support from New River Valley faith communities, VICCC's goal is to create high-quality, affordable, educational, and nurturing care for young children (ages 0-5) of low-income working families in the New River Valley. BPC has been supportive of this endeavor from its inception, providing board members, volunteers, funding, and much needed everyday items necessary for the care of the children.

**Guatemalan Scarves:** Margaret Marsille, who will be returning to visit Mision San Lucas Toliman for the 19th year, will join us at the Alternative Gift Giving Opportunity to sell handwoven scarves from Guatemala. Sales are helping to expand markets for handwoven textiles for local women. Weaving allows the women to work from home and to put food on the table.



### **Hope for Healing in Christ and Community**

from Cobbie Palm and Dessa Quesada Palm, mission co-workers in the Philippines

Dear friends.

Every year, Church Workers of the United Church of Christ in the Philippines gather for a few days at Silliman University at the tail-end of the university's Founder Week celebration to reflect, discuss and to be in community. The Koinonia comes alive with conversations, breaking bread, singing and studying together. During this time, Dessa and Cobbie help put together a play that reflects the theme for each year. After a two-year hiatus of a face-to-face Church Workers' Convocation due to the pandemic, the university opened its door and church workers were able to gather again. In barely three weeks, students and faculty rehearsed a play inspired



by stories of Divinity School students, interns, pastors and church workers. The performances were an effort to reflect on this year's Church Workers' Convocation theme, "Celebrating and Reaffirming our Hope for Healing" amidst the complexities brought about by the pandemic and other compounding social issues facing the church.



The play begins with the celebration of the Koinonia, the symbolic circle of our Christian community that is strengthened by the faithful community. This safe circle and the social fabric are suddenly shaken by the pandemic and its consequent impact on people's lives as seen through the lens of church workers. The stories of five individuals are shared, distinct but interconnected, [with stories of students and pastors who grapple with their own isolation and burdens, and who struggled to provide connection, worship and pastoral care, just as BPC did, during the height of the pandemic.] (Photo, left: Sa Bilog ng Maylikha – In Our Creator's Circle. The play ends with a reflection on Luke 5: 17-26 which tells of the story of Jesus healing the paralyzed man. The characters relate this story to the pandemic and the healing that Jesus shall continue to demonstrate in the context of an ailing world, and the role of the Koinonia, the community to rally around and together support the sick, and to declare their overwhelming faithfulness.

Indeed, we shall be healed through Jesus who works through the collective efforts of our Christian family. We continue to be deeply thankful to you all for accompanying us through your prayers and manifold support amidst all the storms and turmoil that we face as a community. May God bless us and renew us each day.


